December's meeting will feature a tour of EAA's B-17 *Aluminum Overcast*.

John Hopkins, Manager of Aircraft Maintenance will be our tour guide for the evening. Among other things we'll get to see the B-17, Ford Tri-Motor, and the Bleriot project.

EAA's B-17 was delivered to the Army Air Corps in May of 1945, too late in the war to see any action. It was privately purchased in 1946 for the staggering sum of \$750.00. The plane was stripped of its military equipment and worked for a living as a cargo hauler, aerial mapping platform, and a duster.

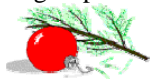
The plane was purchased in 1978 by a group (B-17's Around the World) whose goal was to return it to military condition. The project may have been bigger than anticipated... resulting in the donation of the plane to the EAA in 1983. Since being donated the plane has undergone extensive restoration and repairs by the EAA maintenance staff and volunteers.

Aluminum Overcast was restored in the colors of WW II's 398th Bomb Group, which flew hundreds of missions over Axis held territory during the war. The plane re-enacts a B-17G that was shot down on its 34th combat mission over Le Manior, France, on August 13, 1944. Veterans of the 398th helped finance the bomber's restoration.

Paul Poberezny's own personal interest in homebuilt aircraft did not begin with EAA. In the pre-war decades amateur built aircraft were popular throughout the country, and he was acquainted with a Milwaukee based group called the Milwaukee Lightplane Association. Out on the west coast Les Long and others had been promoting the homebuilt aircraft movement through their Lightplane Association of America (later called the Amateur Aircraft League). The Oregon group called for reasonable training and medical requirements for recreational pilots, and the creation of an "Amateur Experimental License".

The advent of WW II brought many restrictions on personal aviation (all in the interest of National security). In the immediate post war years things did not look like they were going to improve anytime soon, and action was needed.

Welcome New Members

Scott Severson –

Scott (EAA 874664) joined 252 in late October. Scott and his building partner, Keith Wiegmann (who also recently joined the Chapter), are building a Sonex. Scott works on smaller pieces at his home, and transfers the parts to Keith's shop where there is room for the larger assemblies. Scott met Keith while learning to fly with the Freedom of Flight Club.

This is his first homebuilt project, but he does have an extensive aviation background. Scott grew up in the Beloit area, but frequently traveled North to see his uncle Tim Buttles, where an airplane ride and a tour of Tim's latest projects were usually waiting. Uncle Tim's enthusiasm greatly influenced Scott's passion for flight and airplanes.

Scott has worked for Gulfstream Aerospace in Appleton for 8 years. There they receive in new green airplanes that need to be finished (interior, avionics, and painting). The facility also refurbishes older product (corporate aircraft). Scott works in their extensive paint shop. One of his personal goals is to go back to school to get his A&P Mechanic Rating. Scott and his wife Ann live in Hortonville with their four daughters.

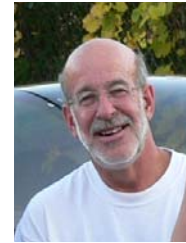
Officers for 2009/2010

Four members are elected by the membership: President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer and they serve a 2-year term. Three additional members are appointed by the president and serve as the Board of Directors, for no specified term.

Executive (elected) Officers

Wayne Daniels, President –

Wayne (EAA 693527) grew up in Carpentersville, IL, not far from O'Hare Airport, which gave him a good view of aircraft flying overhead. He entered military service with the Navy and was stationed on the aircraft carrier USS Enterprise as part of an A6 squadron. After his active service in the Navy, Wayne went to work for the U.S. Post Office until his recent retirement.



He took flying lessons from Larry Marks at Valley Aviation, and received his Private Pilots license in 1987. Wayne also currently holds an instrument rating. He was a member of the Fox Valley Flying Club for 19 years, flying their Cessna 150, Sundowner, and Cherokee. Since 2006 he's been flying his Sonex, which he started building in 2002, about the same time he joined EAA.

Doug Milius, Vice President –



Doug's attraction to aviation must be either genetic, or it could be because he was exposed to it since day one. His father was a B-17 mechanic in the military, and later worked as a mechanic for North Central Airlines out of

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Minneapolis, Doug's hometown. Doug (EAA 190535) earned his Private Pilots license in 1976 and also presently holds an instrument rating. In 1981 Doug joined EAA, and both he and his dad began volunteering at the Kermit Weeks hangar – working on airplanes and helping out as needed.

Doug has owned an Aeronca Champ and Grumman American AA1A, and is currently flying his 1962 Cherokee 160. He's been thinking he might want to rebuild or build an airplane. Doug has been retired for about 2 years after a career with the Wis. Dept. of Revenue.

Doug and his wife Rosann live in Oshkosh. Doug continues to be a regular volunteer during the fly-in, and has worked in Flight Line Operations directing aircraft traffic for about 18 years.

Janet Davidson, Secretary –

Janet (EAA 653207) lived on a farm near Glasgow, Scotland, where she would watch the local training flights from the nearby airport. She came to the United States in 1991 for the purpose of learning how to fly (this decision was inspired by watching the movie "Air America"). After receiving her ratings

(ASEL, AMEL, ASES, CFII), she moved back to the U. K. and flew for the airlines for 7 years. The move to Oshkosh happened in 2001, and Janet joined EAA at that time. She is a volunteer pilot for EAA, often flying their photo plane. Janet is also a corporate pilot for C.R. Meyer flying their Cessna 421 or Citation V.

Janet and her husband, Adam Smith (EAA 653205), own a Cessna 180, and are partners on a Clip-wing Cub. She had previously owned a Nanchang CJ6 (similar to a Yak 18) that she purchased in Yorkshire, England and had shipped to the U.S. This airplane was based in Oshkosh until early 2006. Janet and Adam live in Oshkosh.

Charlie Becker, Treasurer –

Charlie (EAA 515808) and his wife Theresa live in Oshkosh. They moved here in 1999 after he accepted a position



with the EAA, where he now serves as Director of Member Programs.

Charlie grew up in St. Louis, MO. His father had become a late in life pilot and must have triggered his son's interest in aviation. Charlie, his dad, and an instructor flew to the Oshkosh fly-in one year, and Charlie became an EAA member soon after. Jim and his wife Pauline live in Oshkosh. Jim joined EAA (#056712) in 1970, the first year the fly-in permanently moved to Wittman Field.



In 1975 he started helping as a volunteer with Flight Line Operations and Exhibit Buildings, and about this same time joined Chapter 252. Since then he,

and his family, have been regular volunteers at the fly-in. Pauline is co-Chairman of flight line operations, as well as their two daughters (who started directing airplanes when they were 12 or 13 years old). Jim is now Vice Chairman of Flight Line Operations for the fly-in, and Manager of Pioneer Airport during its operating season.

Winter Flying and the Airplane Engine - As good Wisconsin Pilots we know...

It's cold out there. Pre-heat your engine to prevent engine damage (spun bearings or scuffing are not unusual), and make sure the oil has some temperature prior to your first application of high power – like run-up or take-off.

While multi-grade oils certainly reduce the risk, they are not a 100% substitute. Many people still run straight grade oil in the winter. Not a problem. You can run it all year round as long as you take the proper pre-heat precautions. Follow the engine manufacturers recommendations!

Avoid fast cool downs – carry a little power on final to maintain some engine temperature.

Have fun! Despite the cold and wind winter flying can offer some of the best flying conditions.
