If you're looking for a reason to go flying and are looking for a good deal, I suggest you look into EAA's Young Eagle program and sign up for a Phillips 66 Credit Card. Phillips 66 announced at Air Venture this summer they are upping their fuel rebate to \$2.00 a gallon if you fly Young Eagles for EAA. I've flown over 200 Young Eagles and haven't missed a year of flying kids since EAA started the YE program.

It's easy to sign up for the credit card (phillips66aviation.com) and all you have to do is make out a simple form along with your credit card receipt and send it off to Phillips 66 after you've flown your Young Eagle(s).

What does this have to do with flying you are probably asking at this point? Well I'll tell you.

A month ago I flew up to Appleton to fly a Young Eagle for the chapter. It was a beautiful day, CAVU and no wind. I flew back to OSH but it was one of those fine days you hate to put the wheels back on the concrete. Well, I went home and asked my wife Rosann if she'd like to fly to SBM (Sheboygan or for some-She's a Boy Again) for lunch. She agreed and off we went back to the airport. After another preflight we climbed in and were on our way. We flew over Elkhart Lake on the way over and checked out the race track. Not wanting to extend my downwind to Fisk before I turned base I decided to exhibit my flying skills for Rosann and extended my downwind a bit and then turned base. After I turned to final I told Rosann. "I'm going to put the plane in a slip and we'll head down to the runway". Unfortunately my intercom was cutting out and all she heard was, "Slippingheaded down". OH-OH. After landing she asked me, "What the heck was that? I thought we were crashing."

I guess I forgot that we'd never practiced that maneuver in the past although I've done a lot of slipping with other pilots and instructors. What she heard and saw was something completely different than what I was experiencing. I thought I was doing a great job losing altitude and she thought we were headed to our demise. If you've never been in a small plane executing a slip it is a fairly unusual attitude especially for a first timer. I apologized and told her I told thought I said we were going into a slip to loose altitude. At which point she told me what she had heard through her headset.

So, you see, the nearer we got to our destination the more I was slip sliding away and in more ways than one!

### President's Message





# The Young Eagles Experience

### **Impacting The Lives Of Others**

It's interesting to observe how the things we do in our lives can impact the lives of other people. Unknowingly we become mentors. Sometime as a pilot giving a young child a ride, or as a Technical Counselor working with an apprentice or a homebuilder.

The Young Eagles program is a great opportunity for us, as pilots, to introduce to newer generations the wonders of flight. Maybe too, it provides us with a brief glimpse into our own past. We can reexperience through their young eyes – what most of us first experienced many years ago.

One of our newer Chapter members, Mark Beduhn is a very active Young Eagles pilot, having given many rides in his Cozy MK IV.

Mark had mentioned to us how he had given a YE ride to a young girl this past summer that turned into a real aviation experience for her and her dad. She wrote about the experience, submitting her story to Mark who has allowed me to re-print portions of it.

What follows here are excerpts from a story called **Dream a Dream**, that was written by 15-year-old Ruth Rockafield.

"...It was morning, Sunday the 14<sup>th</sup> of June, 2009, bright, clear and sunny. Our whole family packed up to the Rhinelander fly-in. What we knew about it was just what Dad had seen in the flier, which was very little. Pretty much all he knew was that there were going to be airplane rides there. We all wanted to fly of course, but if there was a charge we wouldn't be able to afford it.

When we arrived, we found out that the airplane rides were part of the EAA Young Eagles program, and that they were free! We signed up, and then while waiting to fly I read through the pamphlet that was given to me. I'd never heard of Young Eagles before, and now I can't say enough good about them. I wonder how many children the Young Eagle pilots have helped realize their dream of flying?

My brother, sister, and I all got to go in the same plane, an experimental homebuilt called a Cozy Mark IV. Our pilot, Mark Beduhn, introduced himself and showed us the plane we would be flying in. Because I was the tallest, I got the front seat where I go the best view, and got to see all of the instruments! I was quite sure that it couldn't get any better than that!

After buckling up, starting the engine and talking on the radio, we accelerated down the runway and off into the air. I was so dizzy with it all that breathing was almost out of the question. DREAM A DREAM Ruth Rockafield! It was such a lovely day. The part of the world that I knew as "home" stretched away into a hazy horizon. A few fluffy cumulus clouds floated in the blue, blue sky above, and reflected in the sparkling lakes far below. We were going so fast – around 200 mph – but it seemed like we were almost not moving up there in the vastness of the heavens.

I was happy! When we landed after much too short a time, I couldn't thank Mark enough for helping me realize a dream. It is amazing that the Young Eagles pilots willingly donate their time, planes, and fuel to fly kids – I think that's wonderful. I'm proud to be a member of the Young Eagles, and if I ever have the chance, I'd love to fly other kids some day. I was given my dream, maybe I could give someone else theirs...

A few days later I got an e-mail from Mark's wife Regina... Several short e-mails later Mark wrote to me: "I have a special opportunity for you. If you are interested in coming to AirVenture 2009, I can pick you and your father up in my plane, and fly you to the show for a day..."!

We had a good weekend at AirVenture, and with Mark and his family. I thank God for the way He's blessed me, and I can't afford the words thank Mark enough for the opportunities he gave me. There was a time when I thought that special things happened to other people and not me. I think this last year has proved that very wrong. I feel very privileged to have been given the things I have. Mark has helped me see my dreams of flying much more clearly, and I found a lot of support and information on becoming a pilot at AirVenture. I've been given the chance to get this far and I hope to take this dream as far as it can take me. Now I have a new dream, to become a commercial airline pilot. With all the dreams that have been fulfilled just in the past year; who's to say that I can't achieve anything more? With God's help, I'll find my dreams, and make them reality."
